At Fledglings Pre-School children's voices are heard in all decision making. Children are regularly given opportunity to vote for a story that they want to be read, a dance that they want to join in with or song they want to sing, for example. As well as this, children work with the adults to support projects and to achieve goals such as artwork, construction, as well as having their input with improvement projects such as developing the woodland area.

Class discussions happen often where all responses are valued.

Rule of Law

When the children started the year at Fledglings Pre-School, they came up with ideas on how to have the best time and keep each other safe. The children's ideas were then displayed on a classroom display board and their handprints were added as a sign of commitment. Also, to ensure we are safe in our woodland area, children follow our Forest Explorer promises, which were gathered with their input. Children are aware that actions have consequences and are supported through this by their teachers and keyworkers.

Individual Liberty

Children have extensive opportunity for their own choosing throughout their day at Pre-School by choosing which area of provision they would like to explore.

The environment is set up to maximise children's independence and self-selection to develop their confidence and idea of 'self'.

Children are also provided opportunities for risk taking.

The importance of turn taking and sharing are targeted through a variety of activities.

Children are encouraged to identify and talk about their emotions with reference to the zones of regulation.

Mutual Respect and Tolerance

With Respect being one of our Core Christian values, mutual respect and tolerance are embedded in everything we do. Our Forest Explorer promises and classroom rules are all underpinned by the idea of respecting ourselves, each other, the natural world, and property.

The children are all aware of their belonging at Fledglings Pre-School and talk positively about similarities and differences between each other, their interests, and choices of play. Gender, cultural and racial stereotypes are challenges through a variety of resource, books and activities.
