Reflect on The New Testament which says that Jesus' death was somehow 'for us'. Christians interpret this in a variety of ways: as a sacrifice for sin; as a victory over sin, rescuing the lost and leading them to God; leading from darkness to light, from slavery to freedom. Reflect and evaluate on Christian's belief that Jesus calls them to sacrifice their own needs to the needs of others, and that some are prepared to die for others and for their faith.
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
