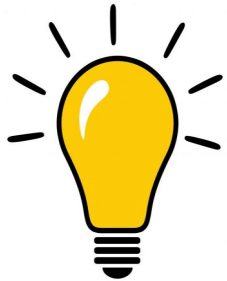

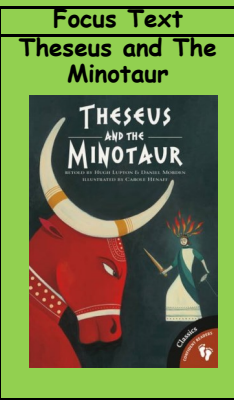


Home Learning Tips

English and Maths will be set once a week based on what we have been learning in school. Keep practising your times tables to 12 and be confident with the corresponding division facts. Read and record a minimum of three times a week. Predict what might happen next or try to summarise the story. Don't forget to read a variety of text types, both fiction and non fiction.



English	Key Vocabulary	Definition
<p>To write an ancient Greek myth.</p> <p>Children will learn and apply discrete grammar to their writing.</p> <p>In Reading, children will read a range of challenging texts and focus on reading fluency (echo and choral reading) and vocabulary based questions.</p>	Compound sentences	<p>Compound sentences have more than one verb and contain two or more clauses.</p> <p>The clauses in a compound sentence still make sense on their own and so we use coordinating conjunctions, such as 'and', 'but' and 'so' to link them together.</p> <p>For example:</p> <p>George realised he had forgotten his wallet <u>so</u> he walked quickly back to the house.</p>
	Complex sentences	<p>Complex sentences include a subordinate clause. Subordinate clauses are sometimes known as 'dependent clauses' because they need the main part of the sentence to make sense. They don't make complete sense on their own.</p> <p>For example:</p> <p>George wanted to stay outside even though it was raining and windy.</p>
	Expanded noun phrases	An expanded noun phrase is a phrase made up of a determiner, noun and an adjectives.
	Parenthesis	Brackets, dashes or commas to include extra information.

Science	To develop an understanding of materials and their properties.

Maths	Key vocabulary	Definition
To develop knowledge of fractions.	Numerator	The numerator is the number above the line in a fraction and shows how many parts we have out of the whole. For example, in the fraction 1/4, the numerator is 1.
	Denominator	The denominator below the line shows how many equal parts there are in total and so what to divide the whole into. For example, in the fraction 1/2, the denominator is 2.
	Mixed number	Mixed fractions are a mix of whole numbers and a fraction together, for example 1 1/2
	Improper fraction	3/2 called an improper fraction, because the numerator is bigger
